Community and Social Service Activity by Cemil Alevli College

In order to increase awareness of their strengths and undertake new challenges, Cemil Alevli College students, as a vital part of their educational program, have initiated a project called "Readers for a Blind Teen." The Creativity-Action-Service (CAS) department has set up a reading service for a blind teen who is a language student in a public high school. Until now, this teen has had difficulty finding someone to read to her practice exams, cloze tests and English exam materials. Cemil Alevli students take turns reading to the blind teen twice a week after school with the co-ordination of the CAS core. The project has been designed so that each student will have completed two three-hour reading sessions by the end of the academic year. The objective of the project, which was developed by Cemil Alevli students, is to encourage development of new skills on many levels, including social skills with a sense of responsibility towards all members of the community. Furthermore, this project perfectly aligns with the objectives of the CAS portion of the IB Diploma Programme and can be expanded to meet CAS requirements once Cemil Alevli has been authorized as an IB DP School.

Hello, my name is Benay Gozkaman, I'm eighteen years old and I am a blind girl. I am attending the 12th grade at Gaziantep IMKB Anatolian High school. I live in Gaziantep. Next year I will go to university and at the end of this semestre I will be taking the university entrance exam like others. So I have to work hard to get a good score. peformance and the last party scene, dance show, deserved praise from parents and teachers. The performance contributed to the personal development, confidence building and mainly to the application of English in several different environments.












The Musical "GYPSY" hit GKY
